Purpose

To establish an online AA meeting for remote and hard to reach areas within Area 91.

Area 91 AA Online "Come as Where You Are" is established to reach as many AA Area 91 members as possible, to fulfil our primary purpose of AA. Our meeting is a respectful, safe and fair environment that binds us in unity.

The meeting is a "closed" meeting, every Sunday evening starting at 7:00 p.m.

Guidelines

- A general user account has been created for Area 91 use, this information is confidential and should not be passed on to anyone outside of the designated user group.
- Use of the Zoom account is for the purpose of Area 91 business/meetings only; personal use of this account is strictly forbidden.
- Meetings cannot overlap each other, please review My Meetings to ensure your meeting time is available.
- Meetings will be chaired by members from the General Service Committee, where each District will have an opportunity to choose a month to host meetings.
- Invited participants don't need a zoom account to join a meeting; please ensure the proper meeting information is sent to your participant listings and must include a copy of the Participants instructions.
- Participants (including the host) choosing to use mobile device would need to download the Zoom application to participate in a meeting.
- Participants and hosts can access a Zoom meeting by one of the following options:
 - o Telephone,
 - Video or Audio conferencing from a computer,
 - Video or Audio conferencing from a device (either tablet or smart phone).
- To protect the anonymity of our members, the online meeting will NOT be recorded at anytime.
- The meeting will be a respectful and safe environment, where unity and fairness will be available for each member in the meeting.
- A meeting standard will be available for the meeting chair. New meeting chairs will need to participate in a monthly session on how to host a meeting.
- Meeting schedule: Week 1 Newcomer Meeting; Week 2 Step Meeting; Week 3 Topic Meeting;
 Week 4 Speaker Meeting; Week 5 Open Meeting (if necessary).
- Participants are asked to enter your First Name and Last Initial only.
- Participants can chose to use the video; they are more than welcome to turn over.
- Participants using Telephone will have their telephone number masked.
- All participants will be placed on mute when the meeting begins.

- Meeting Format:
 - Open with a moment of silence for the suffering alcoholic.
 - o Blue Card Closed
 - Anonymity Statement
 - o Preamble
 - Chapter 5 How it Works.
 - Chair will unmute the participant and ask them to share. Please limit your sharing to 3-5 minutes to allow for others to share.
